India's Digital Payment Revolution

India has emerged as a global leader in digital payments, largely propelled by the Unified Payments Interface (UPI) platform developed by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI). By 2023, UPI transactions had crossed the remarkable milestone of 10 billion per month, a figure that would have seemed extraordinary just a decade ago. The government's ambitious demonetisation drive in 2016 gave the first impetus to digital adoption, but it was the sustained ecosystem-building—spanning affordable smartphones, cheap mobile data, and a robust regulatory framework—that cemented the habit.

Two platforms dominate the UPI landscape: PhonePe and Google Pay (GPay), together accounting for nearly 80 per cent of all UPI transaction volume. Their success has spurred fierce competition from homegrown players like Paytm and BHIM, keeping innovation at the forefront. For rural India, the proliferation of QR-code merchants has been transformative. Small vegetable vendors, auto-rickshaw



drivers, and tea-stall owners who once operated exclusively in cash now accept digital payments seamlessly, bridging the financial inclusion gap that had long hampered economic equity.

Digital wallets, too, have seen exponential growth. Pre-paid instruments and wallet-based transactions registered consistent double-digit growth year-on-year. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has played a pivotal regulatory role, mandating interoperability, setting transaction limits to curb fraud, and promoting the RuPay card network to reduce dependence on foreign card schemes. India's digital payment story is now being studied by developing nations as a replicable model, with several countries approaching NPCI for technical collaboration to establish UPI-like infrastructure on their own soil.

The Climate Emergency and Green Economy

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) sixth assessment report, released between 2021 and 2022, delivered an unambiguous verdict: global warming of 1.5°C above pre-industrial levels could be reached as early as the 2030s unless deep and rapid reductions in greenhouse gas emissions are achieved across all sectors. The report underscored that extreme weather events—floods, droughts, and wildfires—are already more frequent and intense, and that the window for effective climate action is rapidly narrowing.

India, as one of the world's largest economies and emitters, has responded with ambitious commitments. Under the Paris Agreement, India pledged to source 50 per cent of its cumulative electric power from non-fossil sources by 2030. Separately, the government announced a renewable energy target of 500 GW by the year 2030, encompassing solar, wind, and other clean energy technologies. The National Green Hydrogen Mission, launched in January 2023, aims to make India a global hub for green hydrogen production and export, with a target of producing 5 million metric tonnes per annum by 2030. Carbon pricing mechanisms—including carbon credits and emissions trading schemes—are gaining traction as market-based tools to incentivise emission reductions in energy-intensive industries.

Globally, the transition to a green economy is gathering pace, but it demands unprecedented levels of investment in clean technology, infrastructure, and human capital. The International Energy Agency estimates that achieving net-zero emissions by 2050 will require annual clean energy investment of around 4 trillion US dollars by the early 2030s. Developing nations argue, with considerable justification, that they need substantial climate finance from developed countries to make this transition equitable. The debate over loss and damage funding—compensation for climate impacts already being felt—remains one of the most contentious issues in international climate negotiations.

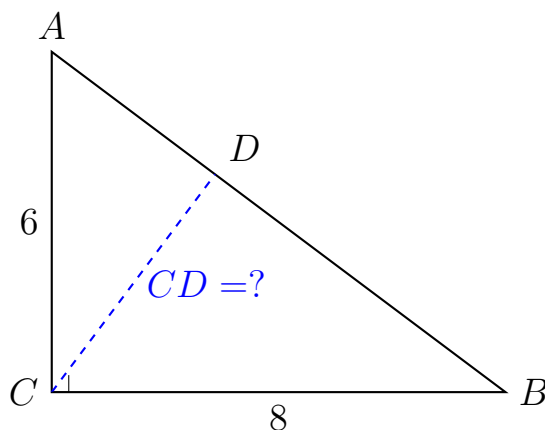

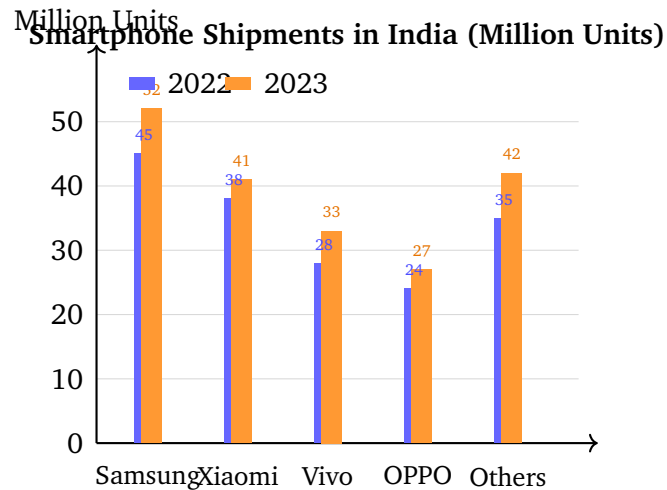

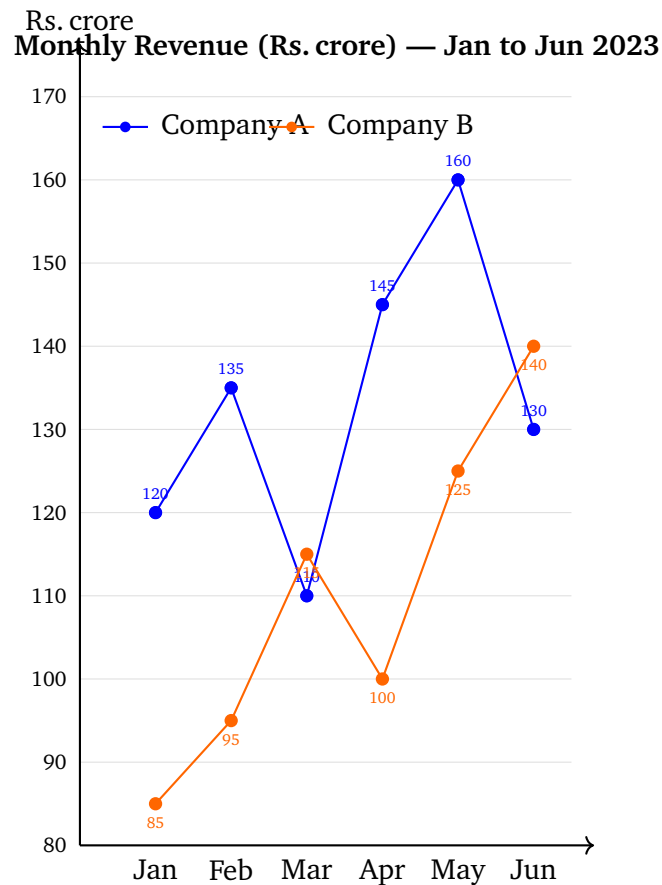

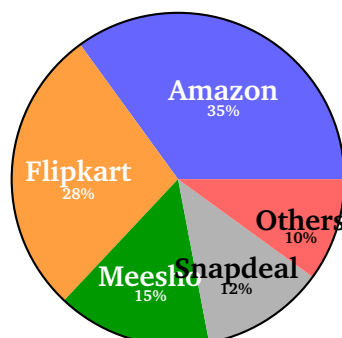

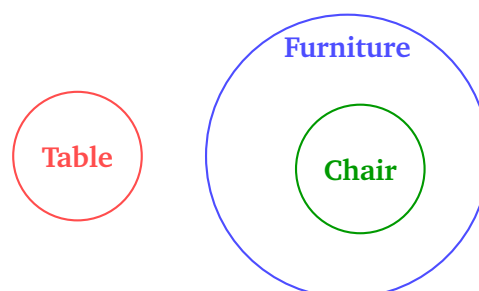

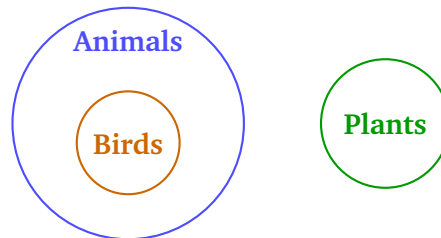

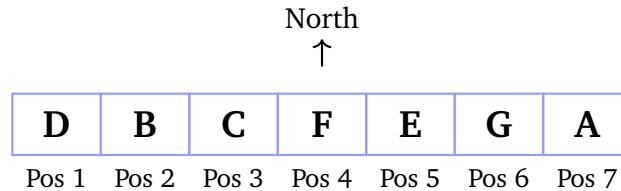
