The global trading order that emerged after World War II, anchored by the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and its successor the World Trade Organisation (WTO), is under unprecedented strain. The WTO's dispute-settlement mechanism has been effectively paralysed since the United States blocked the appointment of new appellate body judges from 2017 onwards, signalling Washington's growing disillusionment with multilateral rules-based trade. The US–China trade war, which began in 2018 under President Trump and deepened under President Biden, has resulted in tariffs of up to 145% on Chinese goods entering the United States, prompting Beijing to retaliate with counter-measures across agricultural and industrial goods. These de-



velopments have accelerated a global shift from free trade to managed or protected trade.

India, too, has embraced import substitution as a strategic priority. The Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme covers fourteen sectors from semi-conductors to pharmaceuticals, aiming to reduce import dependence and attract foreign direct investment. At the same time, India has pursued bilateral free trade agreements with the UAE, Australia and the UK, even as it shelved its participation in the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) in 2019, citing concerns about Chinese goods flooding domestic markets. Supply chain diversification—the deliberate move to reduce reliance on any single nation—has become a corporate and geopolitical imperative. The semiconductor sector epitomises this: the US CHIPS Act allocates USD 52 billion to domestic chip fabrication, while Japan, Taiwan and the European Union have all launched parallel programmes. Reshoring and “friend-shoring” are now mainstream vocabulary in global boardrooms, suggesting that the era of hyperglobalisation may have peaked.

The world of work is undergoing the most profound transformation since the Industrial Revolution. The COVID-19 pandemic normalised remote work almost overnight, compelling organisations to redesign workflows, invest in digital infrastructure and reconsider the purpose of physical office space. Simultaneously, automation—powered by machine learning, robotic process automation and generative artificial intelligence—is eliminating routine cognitive and manual jobs at an accelerating rate. McKinsey estimates that up to 30% of current work activities could be automated by 2030.

Yet the picture is not uniformly bleak. The gig economy has exploded, providing flexible income opportunities for millions even as it raises questions about job security, social-security entitlements and income volatility. Demand for digital literacy, data analysis, cybersecurity and human-AI collaboration skills has surged. Reskilling has become a policy priority: governments from Singapore to Germany have launched national programmes to retrain displaced workers. The widening income gap between high-skill knowledge workers and those displaced by automation has reignited debate about Universal Basic Income (UBI) as a social safety net. Pilot programmes in Finland, Kenya and Stockton, California, have shown mixed but generally positive results in reducing poverty and improving well-being without significantly reducing work effort. Hybrid work models—blending in-office collaboration with remote flexibility—have emerged as the dominant paradigm for knowledge-sector employers, challenging traditional notions of productivity measurement and managerial oversight.

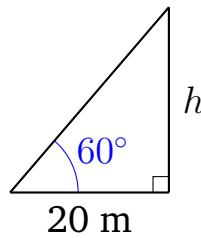

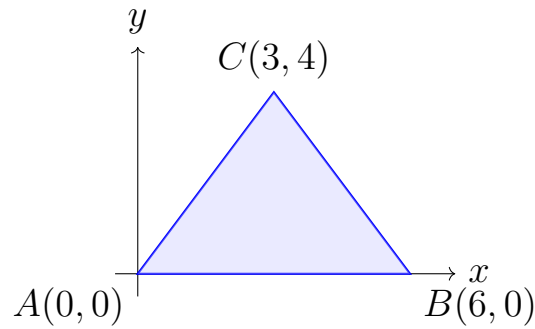

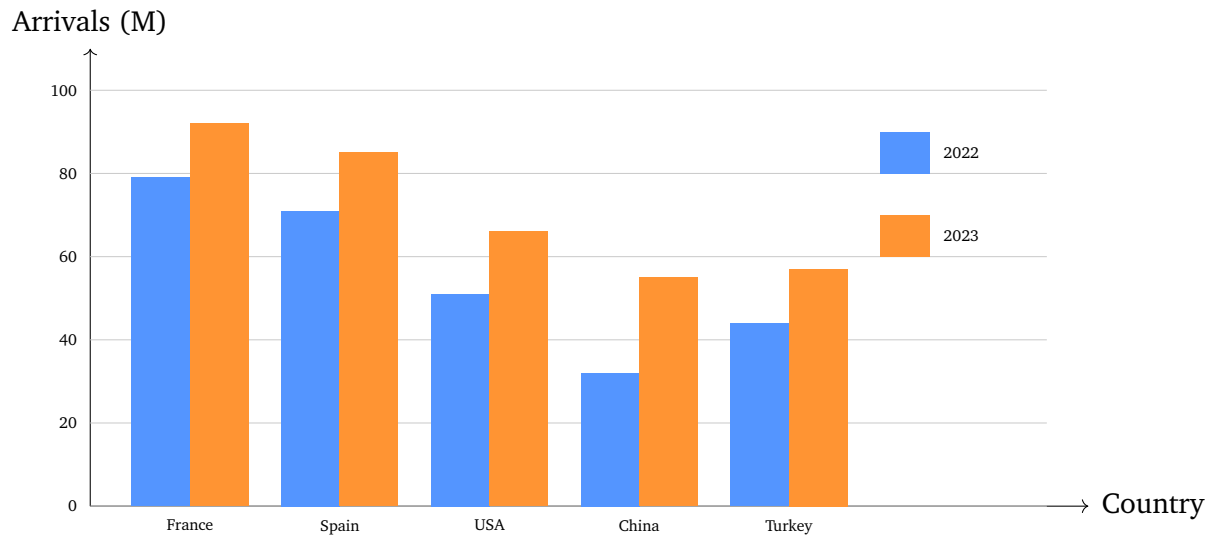

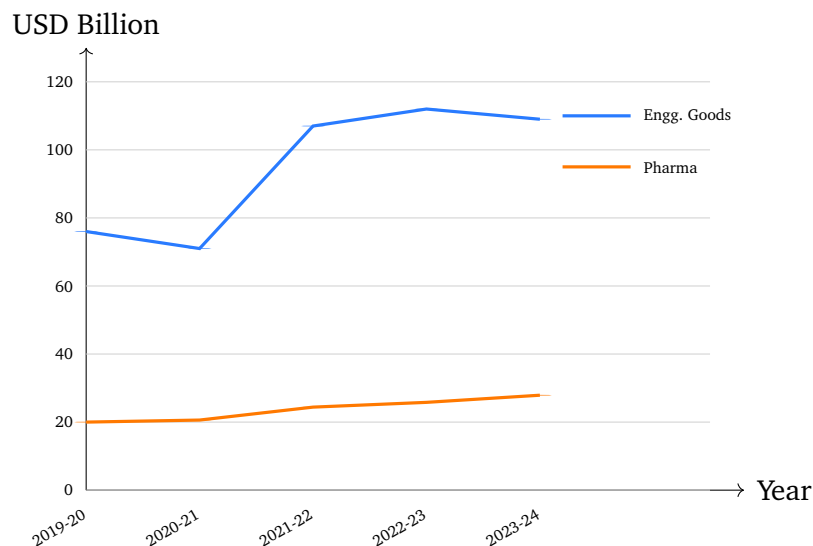

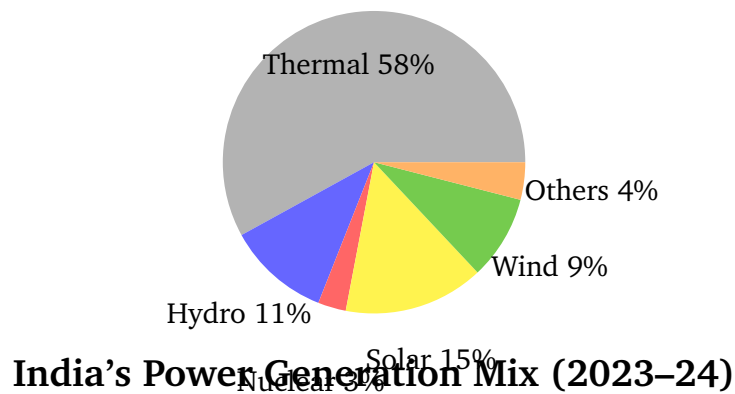
