Questions 1–5: Read the following passage carefully and answer the questions that follow.

The debate between utilitarianism and Kantian deontology represents one of the most enduring fault-lines in moral philosophy. Jeremy Bentham, and later John Stuart Mill, argued that the rightness of an action is determined entirely by its consequences: the greatest happiness of the greatest number. This *greatest happiness principle* treats pleasure and pain as the sole currency of moral calculus. A policy that maximises aggregate well-being is morally correct, even if it requires sacrificing the interests of a minority. Mill refined this view by distinguishing higher from lower pleasures, insisting that intellectual satisfaction outweighs mere bodily gratification in the utilitarian ledger.

Immanuel Kant rejected this consequentialist framework with characteristic rigour. For Kant, the moral worth of an action derives not from its outcomes but from the principle that motivates it. The *categorical imperative*—act only according to that maxim whereby you can at the same time will that it should become a universal law—demands that we treat persons always as ends in themselves, never



merely as means. Lying, even to save a life, violates the categorical imperative because universalising the maxim “lie when convenient” destroys the very institution of truth-telling.

The trolley problem, devised by Philippa Foot and later extended by Judith Jarvis Thomson, crystallises this tension. A runaway trolley hurtles toward five people; pulling a lever diverts it to a side track where one person stands. Utilitarians endorse pulling the lever: five lives outweigh one. Kantians hesitate: using the one person as a means to save the five treats them as an instrument, violating their dignity as a rational agent.

Contemporary AI ethics has revived both frameworks with new urgency. Autonomous vehicles programmed to minimise casualties embed utilitarian reasoning; algorithmic content moderation that silences hate speech weighs collective benefit against individual expression. Critics argue that purely utilitarian AI risks justifying discriminatory profiling whenever aggregate outcomes improve. Kantian defenders counter that any AI system must encode inviolable rights—privacy, autonomy, non-discrimination—regardless of social-utility calculations. The debate, far from academic, shapes the design of systems that make life-and-death decisions at scale.

Fiscal deficits—the shortfall between government revenue and expenditure—are an inescapable feature of modern public finance, but their long-run implications remain contested. The *twin deficit hypothesis* posits that a large fiscal deficit tends to produce a corresponding current-account deficit: government borrowing crowds out private saving, pushes up domestic interest rates, attracts foreign capital, appreciates the exchange rate, and ultimately widens the trade gap. Empirical support is mixed; the relationship holds robustly in some countries but dissolves in others depending on the openness of the capital account and the responsiveness of private saving.

The *crowding-out effect* occupies a central place in orthodox macroeconomics. When the government borrows heavily in domestic markets, it competes with private firms for loanable funds. Rising interest



rates depress private investment, reducing the productive capacity of the economy over time. Critics of austerity counter that crowding-out is largely irrelevant at the zero lower bound: when short-term interest rates are already at or near zero, additional government borrowing does not appreciably raise financing costs for the private sector.

Modern Monetary Theory (MMT) challenges orthodox assumptions more radically. MMT proponents argue that a government issuing its own sovereign currency cannot be forced into insolvency by domestic debt; it can always create money to service obligations. The binding constraint is not debt per se but inflationary pressure: deficits become problematic only when they push spending beyond the economy's productive capacity. MMT therefore advocates large fiscal stimulus to achieve full employment, with taxation serving as the primary tool to withdraw excess purchasing power and control inflation.

Debt sustainability analysis, conducted by institutions such as the IMF, examines whether the primary surplus (revenue minus non-interest expenditure) is sufficient to stabilise the debt-to-GDP ratio. A country is on a sustainable path when the real interest rate on its debt does not persistently exceed its real GDP growth rate. Several advanced economies have benefited from low-interest environments that allowed debt accumulation without triggering solvency concerns—a condition that higher interest-rate regimes of the post-2022 period are now testing severely.

The cultural history of medieval India is inseparable from the twin currents of Bhakti and Sufi thought, which together produced a remarkable synthesis across religious boundaries. The Bhakti movement, rooted in devotional theism, challenged the ritual exclusivism of Brahmanical orthodoxy. Poets such as Kabir, Mirabai, and Tukaram composed in vernacular languages—Hindi, Marathi, and Rajasthani—making spiritual discourse accessible to artisans, weavers, and women who had been excluded from Sanskrit learning. Kabir's dohas drew simultaneously on Hindu and Islamic imagery, insisting that the divine transcended both the temple and the mosque.

Sufism, the mystical dimension of Islam, found particularly fertile ground in the subcontinent. The *silsilas* (orders) established *khanqahs* (hospices) that served as centres of syncretic devotion, music, and poetry. The Chishti order, founded by Muinuddin Chishti in Ajmer, became synonymous with the tradition of *sama* (devotional music) and attracted followers regardless of faith. This willingness to engage across communal lines produced a shared devotional culture that historians describe as a “composite” tradition.

The Vijayanagara Empire (1336–1646), though often characterised as a bastion of Hindu political power, was in practice a sophisticated commercial polity deeply integrated into Indian Ocean trade networks. Its capital, Hampi, was described by the Portuguese traveller Domingo Paes as one of the best-provisioned cities in the world. Vijayanagara rulers patronised Telugu, Kannada, and Sanskrit literary traditions simultaneously, fostering a multilingual literary culture of exceptional vitality. Pepper, cotton textiles, and horses from the Arabian Peninsula formed the core of its trade with Arab and Portuguese merchants.

Regional literary traditions flourished across the subcontinent during this period. Vidyapati's Maithili compositions celebrating Radha and Krishna anticipated themes later explored in Brajbhasha poetry. In the Deccan, the Bahmani Sultanate patronised Urdu, which was crystallising as a literary language from the fusion of Persian, Arabic, and local dialects. These diverse literary cultures were not merely decorative; they constituted the ideological framework through which rulers legitimised power and communities expressed identity.

Large language models (LLMs) represent a qualitative leap in artificial intelligence capability, yet they carry an inherent and widely documented flaw: the tendency to “hallucinate”—to produce fluent, confident, and entirely fabricated statements. Unlike conventional software that either executes instructions correctly or throws an error, an LLM generates outputs probabilistically, selecting tokens on the basis of statistical associations rather than verified facts. This means that an LLM can assert with equal grammatical confidence that the boiling point of water is 100 °C and that a fictional treaty was signed in 1847—because linguistic fluency and factual accuracy are orthogonal properties of the model's architecture.

The hallucination problem poses acute challenges for high-stakes deployment: legal research, medical diagnosis, financial advice, and investigative journalism all require outputs that are not merely plausible but verifiably true. Proposed mitigations include retrieval-augmented generation (RAG), which



grounds model responses in a retrieved document corpus; constitutional AI approaches that train models to self-critique using rule sets; and human-in-the-loop review mechanisms. None of these solutions is fully satisfactory: RAG introduces latency and corpus-boundary errors; constitutional AI risks encoding the biases of rule-authors; and human review does not scale to the volumes at which LLMs operate.

Regulatory frameworks are emerging to address these risks. The EU AI Act, adopted in 2024, classifies LLMs as “general-purpose AI” systems subject to transparency obligations, risk assessment, and mandatory disclosure when content is AI-generated. Sector-specific regulators in finance and health-care are layering additional requirements. Yet regulatory approaches face a fundamental tension: overly prescriptive rules stifle innovation, while light-touch regimes leave citizens inadequately protected.

The most productive framing may be that of *human-AI collaboration*: treating LLMs as powerful cognitive tools that amplify human capability rather than as autonomous agents that replace human judgment. Under this model, the human retains epistemic authority—the right and responsibility to verify, challenge, and override AI outputs—while the AI handles volume, speed, and pattern recognition. This asymmetry, critics note, requires well-trained, critically literate human partners, raising questions of educational equity that have no easy answers.

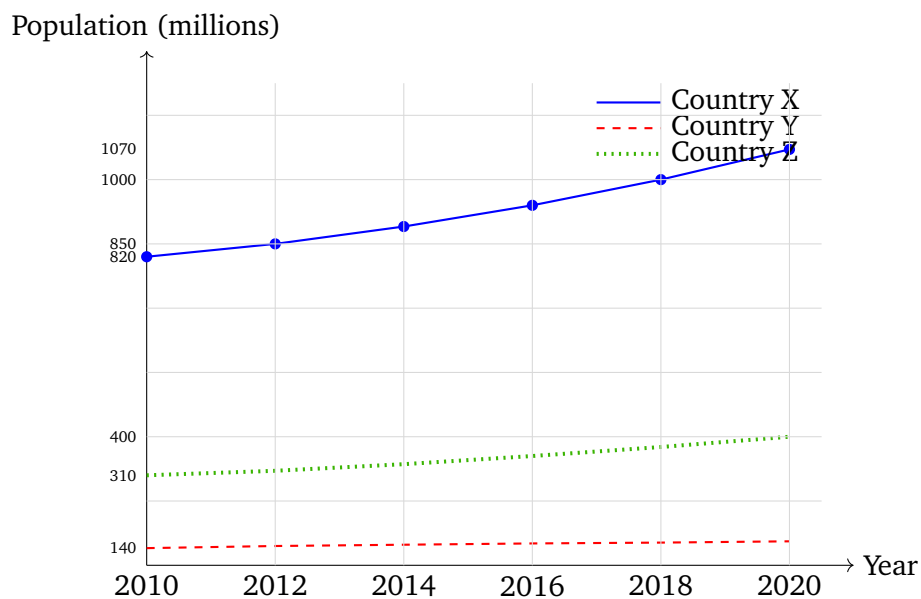

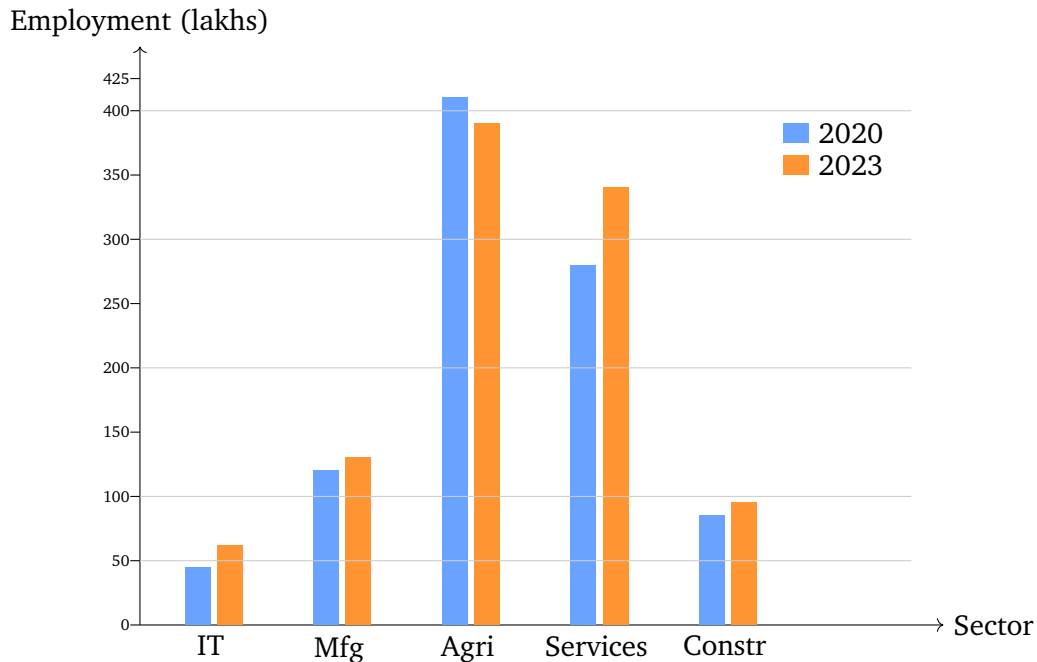

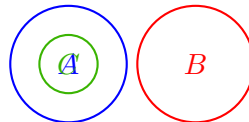
