DETAILED SOLUTIONS — Sample Paper 3

Solution 1.

Solution

Topic: International Summits — BRICS 2023

The 15th BRICS Summit was held in **Johannesburg, South Africa** in August 2023. It was a landmark summit at which six new countries were invited to join BRICS (Argentina, Egypt, Ethiopia, Iran, Saudi Arabia, UAE), expanding the bloc significantly. South Africa, as the host, chaired the summit under the theme “BRICS and Africa: Partnership for Mutually Accelerated Growth, Sustainable Development and Inclusive Multilateralism.”

Topic: International Summits — G20 2023

The G20 Summit 2023 (18th G20 Summit) was held on **9–10 September 2023** in **New Delhi**, India, at Bharat Mandapam. India held the G20 presidency from December 2022 to November 2023 under the theme “Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam” (One Earth, One Family, One Future). It was the first G20 Summit hosted by India.

Topic: Space Science — Chandrayaan-3

India’s **Chandrayaan-3** mission successfully soft-landed its Vikram lander on the **South Pole region** of the Moon on 23 August 2023, making India the **first country** to achieve a soft landing near the lunar south pole. With this achievement, India became only the **fourth country** in the world (after the USA, Soviet Union, and China) to successfully soft-land on the Moon.

Topic: National Days — National Sports Day

National Sports Day is observed on **29 August** every year in India. This date commemorates the birthday of legendary hockey player **Major Dhyan Chand** (born 29 August 1905), who is considered one of the greatest hockey players of all time. The Rajiv Gandhi Khel Ratna Award ceremony is also held on this day.

Topic: Olympics — Paris 2024 New Sport

Breaking (Breakdancing) made its debut as an official **Olympic sport at the Paris 2024 Games**. It was added to the programme as a youth-oriented urban sport. Athletes are called B-boys and B-girls and compete in head-to-head battles judged on technique, creativity, and musicality. Notably, it was included only for Paris 2024 and is not currently on the programme for LA 2028.

Topic: Military Honours — Param Vir Chakra

The **Param Vir Chakra** (PVC) is India's highest wartime military decoration. It is awarded to members of the armed forces for the **most conspicuous bravery or some daring or pre-eminent act of valour or self-sacrifice in the presence of the enemy**, whether on land, at sea, or in the air. The award was instituted on 26 January 1950. Recipients include Captain Vikram Batra and Lance Naik Albert Ekka.

Topic: Indian History — Maratha Empire

Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj founded the **Maratha Empire** (also called the Maratha Confederacy) in the 17th century. He established a competent and progressive civil rule, built a strong military force using guerrilla warfare tactics, and created an independent Maratha kingdom free from Mughal and Bijapur Sultanate influence. He was crowned Chhatrapati at Raigad Fort in 1674. The Peshwas later became the de facto heads of the confederacy.

Topic: Indian Geography — Deccan Plateau

The **Deccan Plateau** is a large triangular plateau in peninsular India. It is bounded by the **Western Ghats** on the west and the **Eastern Ghats** on the east. The Vindhya and Satpura ranges form its northern boundary. The plateau slopes gently from west to east, which is why most rivers (Godavari, Krishna, Cauvery) flow eastward into the Bay of Bengal. Correct answer: **Eastern Ghats and Western Ghats.**

Topic: Maharashtra Geography — Pune's Rivers

Pune city is situated on the confluence of the **Mula** and **Mutha** rivers, collectively referred to as the **Mula-Mutha river**. Both rivers are tributaries of the Bhima river, which ultimately drains into the Krishna river. The Khadakwasla Dam on the Mutha river is a primary water source for Pune. The city is often called the “Oxford of the East” for its educational institutions.

Topic: Indian Freedom Struggle — Simon Commission

The **Simon Commission** arrived in India in **1928**. It was a statutory commission of seven British MPs, chaired by Sir John Simon, sent to study constitutional reforms. Since no Indian was included in the commission, it triggered massive protests across India under the slogan “**Simon Go Back**”. The Congress party boycotted it. In response, the Indian National Congress drafted the Nehru Report (1928) outlining India’s constitutional demands.

Topic: Maharashtra Geography — Forest Cover

Gadchiroli district in the Vidarbha region of Maharashtra has the **highest forest cover** in the state. Approximately 76–80% of Gadchiroli’s area is under forest cover (nearly 14,412 sq.km). The district is home to dense teak and bamboo forests and is part of the Central Indian tiger landscape. This dense forest cover makes it one of the most ecologically rich but also one of the most remote districts in Maharashtra.

Topic: Space Science — Gaganyaan Mission

Gaganyaan is India’s first human spaceflight programme, being developed by the **Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO)**. The mission aims to send a 3-member crew to a 400 km orbit for a 3-day mission and bring them back safely. The programme received Cabinet approval in 2018. It will make India only the **fourth country** (after Russia, USA, and China) to conduct a human spaceflight independently.

Topic: Indian Polity — NITI Aayog

NITI Aayog (National Institution for Transforming India) was established on **1 January 2015** and replaced the **Planning Commission**, which had been in existence since 1950. Unlike the Planning Commission, which had the power to allocate funds, NITI Aayog is a think-tank that provides strategic and technical advice to the government. It is chaired by the Prime Minister of India.

Topic: Indian Constitution — Fundamental Rights Amendments

The **Right to Property** (originally Article 19(1)(f) and Article 31) was removed from the list of Fundamental Rights by the **44th Constitutional Amendment Act, 1978**, enacted during the Janata Party government under Prime Minister Morarji Desai. It was converted into a mere legal right under **Article 300-A**. The 25th and 42nd amendments also curtailed property rights, but the complete removal was done by the 44th Amendment.

Topic: Human Development Index — India's Ranking

According to the **Human Development Report 2023/24** published by UNDP, India's rank in the Human Development Index (HDI) is **134** out of 193 countries. India's HDI value is 0.644, placing it in the **medium human development** category. India has shown consistent improvement in life expectancy, education, and per capita income indicators over the past decade. Switzerland, Norway, and Iceland top the HDI rankings.

Solution 16.**Solution****Topic:** Number Series — $n(n + 1)$ PatternThe series follows the pattern $n \times (n + 1)$:

- $1 \times 2 = 2$
- $2 \times 3 = 6$
- $3 \times 4 = 12$
- $4 \times 5 = 20$
- $5 \times 6 = 30$
- $6 \times 7 = 42$

Alternatively, note the differences: 4, 6, 8, 10, 12 (increasing by 2). So next term = $30 + 12 = 42$.

In the pair **PRT : QSU**, each letter is shifted +1 position forward in the alphabet:

$$P \rightarrow Q, \quad R \rightarrow S, \quad T \rightarrow U$$

Applying the same rule to **LNP**:

$$L \rightarrow M, \quad N \rightarrow O, \quad P \rightarrow Q$$

Therefore, **LNP** → **MOQ**.

Topic: Word Analogy — Functional Relationship

A **Dam** is a structure that controls and regulates the flow of a **River**. By analogy, a **Signal** is the device that controls and regulates the flow of **Traffic**. This is a “controller/regulator” relationship. A road is where traffic moves (not a controller), a vehicle is part of traffic (not its regulator), and a police officer controls some traffic but a signal is the primary automated control mechanism.

Topic: Odd One Out — Days in a Month

- January — 31 days
- March — 31 days
- **June — 30 days** ← Odd one out
- August — 31 days
- October — 31 days

June is the only month in the list with **30 days**; all others have 31 days. This makes June the odd one out based on the number of days criterion.

Topic: Directions — Displacement Calculation

Sita's journey: 10 km East → 10 km South → 10 km West.

The eastward and westward components cancel: $+10 - 10 = 0$ km (E-W net displacement = 0).

The only net displacement is **10 km South**.



Therefore, she is **10 km South** of her starting point P.

Topic: Matrix Pattern — Multiplication Rule

Each entry in the matrix = (Row base value) $\times$ (Column number):

- Row 1 (base 2): $2 \times 1 = 2$, $2 \times 2 = 4$, $2 \times 3 = 6$
- Row 2 (base 3): $3 \times 1 = 3$, $3 \times 2 = 6$, $3 \times 3 = 9$
- Row 3 (base 4): $4 \times 1 = 4$, $4 \times 2 = 8$, $4 \times 3 = 12$

Missing value = $4 \times 3 = 12$.

Topic: Letter Coding — Shift +2

In the code, each letter is shifted **+2** positions forward:

$$T \rightarrow V, \quad I \rightarrow K, \quad G \rightarrow I, \quad E \rightarrow G, \quad R \rightarrow T$$

Wait—let us verify TIGER $\rightarrow$ VJIGT: $T \rightarrow V (+2)$, $I \rightarrow J (+1)$, $G \rightarrow I (+2)$, $E \rightarrow G (+2)$, $R \rightarrow T (+2)$. The second letter shifts by +1. Actually: $T(20) \rightarrow V(22)+2$, $I(9) \rightarrow J(10)+1$, $G(7) \rightarrow I(9)+2$, $E(5) \rightarrow G(7)+2$, $R(18) \rightarrow T(20)+2$. Pattern: +2 except position 2 uses +1—but more likely the pattern is each letter shifts +2 except the pattern reverses. Re-examining: TIGER $\rightarrow$ VJIGT—if letters are shifted by 2 each: V,K,I,G,T $\neq$ VJIGT. The actual code: $T+2=V$, $I+1=J$... Actually looking at VJIGT, it appears the word is coded with an extra letter inserted or rearranged. $T \rightarrow V(+2)$, $I \rightarrow J(+1)$ —hmm. Let us try another approach: shift each letter by its position number: $T+1=U$? No. Or: the word is reversed then shifted? REGIT $\rightarrow$ VJIGT? $R+4=V$, $E+5=J$, $G+2=I$, $I+(-3)=F$? No. Let us try: each letter +2: VJIGT would be V,J,I,G,T. $T+2=V$ ✓, $I+1=J$... $I(9)+1=J(10)$. Hmm position 2 is +1. Actually



perhaps the coding shifts alternate +2, +1, +2, +2, +2 — or perhaps it is simply each letter shifted by +2 with wrapping and the answer JQTUG for HORSE: H+2=J, O+2=Q, R+2=T, S+2=U, E+2=G. So HORSE → **JQTUG**. The TIGER example: T+2=V, I+2=K... but we get VJIGT not VKIGT. Perhaps TIGER→VJIGT uses +2, +1, +2, +2, +2 but for consistency, HORSE→JQTUG uses +2 for all. The answer based on standard +2 shift is JQTUG.

Topic: Letter Series — Skipping Alternating Letters (Backward)

The series Z, X, V, T, R, ? decreases by skipping one letter (moving 2 positions backward) each time:

$$Z \xrightarrow{-2} X \xrightarrow{-2} V \xrightarrow{-2} T \xrightarrow{-2} R \xrightarrow{-2} P$$

Alphabetically: Z(26), X(24), V(22), T(20), R(18), **P(16)**. Each step decreases by 2 positions. The next letter is **P**.

Topic: Syllogism — Logical Deduction

Statement 1: All mangoes are fruits. (Mangoes $\subset$ Fruits)

Statement 2: Some fruits are sweet. (Fruits $\cap$ Sweet $\neq \emptyset$)

From the Venn diagram, all mangoes lie inside the Fruits circle. The Sweet circle overlaps *some* of the Fruits circle—but it is not known whether that overlap includes the Mangoes subset. Hence, we **cannot definitively conclude** that any mango is sweet; the overlap may or may not include the mangoes region. Therefore, the correct answer is: **No definite conclusion about mangoes being sweet can be drawn.**

Topic: Blood Relations — Generation Tracing

“X’s mother is Y’s daughter.” This means:

$$Y \xrightarrow{\text{daughter}} \text{X's mother} \xrightarrow{\text{mother}} X$$

So Y is the **mother of X’s mother**, i.e., Y is X’s **maternal grandmother**. Since the question uses “Y” (no gender specified in the question), and the answer options include “Grandmother,” the correct answer is **Grandmother**.

- $8 = 2^3$ ✓

The target consists of 10 concentric scoring rings. The 10-ring (bull's-eye) has a diameter of approximately 0.5 mm for the inner 10 (X ring). Simply repeating the same training stimulus produces no further improvement (adaptation plateau). Heart rate is measured at specific intervals after exercise and a **Physical Fitness Index (PFI)** is calculated. A higher PFI indicates better cardiovascular fitness. In exercise science and resistance training, **RM** stands for **Repetition Maximum**. For example, a 10RM load is the maximum weight someone can lift exactly 10 times before failure. RM values are used to prescribe training intensity (e.g., “3 sets of 8 at 75% of 1RM”).

VO_2 max (maximal oxygen uptake) is defined as the **maximum rate at which the body can consume oxygen during intense, exhaustive exercise**. Elite endurance athletes (cross-country skiers, cyclists) typically have VO_2 max values of 70–90 mL/kg/min. A higher VO_2 max indicates superior aerobic capacity and endurance performance potential.
