1. Upanayan Sanskar is related to which education?

- (A) Vedic
- (B) Jain
- (C) Buddhist
- (D) Muslim

Correct Answer: (A) Vedic

Solution:

Step 1: Understanding the Concept:

Upanayan Sanskar is the sacred thread ceremony that marked a child's formal entry into schooling in the ancient Indian education system. It comes from the group of 16 sanskaras (rites of passage) described in Vedic tradition.

Step 2: Why option A is correct.

In the Vedic gurukul system, a boy was sent to live with a guru after this ceremony to begin his study of the Vedas, grammar, and other

shastras. The word "Upanayan" itself means "leading near," referring to the child being led near the guru to start education.

Step 3: Why the other options are wrong.

Jain education centered on monastic teaching in upashrayas, not on a sanskrit-style thread ceremony. Buddhist education was organized around monasteries (viharas) and ordination as a monk, not a household sanskara. Muslim (Islamic) education in India was based on the maktab and madrasa system, again with no link to Upanayan.

Final Answer:

Upanayan Sanskar belongs to the Vedic education system. This corresponds to option (A).

11. Write the features of Basic Education Scheme.

animals, reducing biodiversity.

4. Reduced quality of life: noise and visual pollution add daily stress, and polluted surroundings lower general well-being.

17. Explain the main causes of natural disaster.

Heavy, continuous rainfall causes floods. Very low rainfall over a long period causes drought. Strong pressure differences in the atmosphere create cyclones and storms.

Step 4: Human-worsened causes.

Cutting down forests removes natural flood control and increases landslide risk. Poor drainage planning in cities worsens flood damage. Climate change from pollution is making extreme weather events more frequent and severe.

Final Answer:

Natural disasters are mainly caused by tectonic and volcanic activity, extreme weather patterns, and are often worsened by human actions like deforestation and pollution.

18. Explain the use of principle of Trial and Error in education.

Correct Answer: —

Solution:

Step 1: Understanding the Concept:

The Trial and Error theory of learning was given by Edward Thorndike, based on his experiments with cats trying to escape a puzzle box. A learner tries different responses to a problem, and the response that brings success gets "stamped in" through repetition, while unsuccessful responses fade away.

Step 2: Thorndike's laws behind this.

1. Law of Effect: a response followed by satisfaction is strengthened; one followed by discomfort is weakened.
2. Law of Exercise: a response repeated often becomes stronger and more automatic.
3. Law of Readiness: learning works best when the learner is mentally and physically ready to act.

Step 3: Use in education.

1. Teachers let students attempt a problem themselves (like a maths sum or a science experiment) instead of only showing the method first, so students learn through their own successful and unsuccessful attempts.
2. Mistakes are treated as a normal, useful part of learning rather than something to fear.
3. Practice and repetition of correct responses are built into lessons and homework, matching the Law of Exercise.
4. Rewards, praise, and marks are used to strengthen correct responses, matching the Law of Effect.

Final Answer:

Trial and error is used in education by letting students attempt problems directly, treating mistakes as learning steps, reinforcing

correct responses through practice and reward, in line with Thorndike's laws of effect, exercise, and readiness.

19. Define mental health and name the factors affecting it.

20. What steps should a teacher take if symptoms of mental stress are seen in a student?

Step 2: Step-by-step response.

2. Talk privately: speak to the student alone, gently, to understand what is troubling them, without pressure or blame.
3. Build trust: listen without judging and assure the student that their feelings are taken seriously.
4. Adjust academic pressure: give the student some flexibility with

deadlines or workload while they are struggling.

5. Involve parents and counsellors: inform parents sensitively and refer the student to the school counsellor if the stress continues.

6. Create a supportive classroom: encourage peer support and avoid public criticism that could add to the stress.

21. Explain the steps of construction of achievement test with example.

Step 2: The steps.

1. Planning: decide the purpose of the test, the subject, and the class level. Example: a test on the chapter "Photosynthesis" for class 10 science.

2. Preparing a blueprint: make a table showing how many questions

will come from each topic, and at what difficulty and question-type (MCQ, short answer, etc.), so coverage is balanced.

3. Writing items: write the actual questions based on the blueprint, covering knowledge, understanding, and application of the topic.

4. Arranging items: order questions from easy to difficult, and group similar types together for clarity.

5. Preparing a marking scheme: fix the marks for each question and, for subjective answers, the key points expected.

6. Try-out (administering to a small group): give the draft test to a small sample of students first, to catch confusing questions.

7. Item analysis: review the try-out results to check if questions are of the right difficulty and correctly separate strong and weak students, then revise or drop poor items.

23. Describe the Buddhist education system in detail.

Buddhist education grew around monasteries (viharas), built to train monks in the teachings of the Buddha, and later opened to a wider student community. Famous centres included Nalanda, Taxila, and Vikramashila.

Step 2: Entry and daily life.

A student, usually a boy, was admitted through a formal ordination ceremony (pabbajja) and became a novice monk. Life in the vihara was disciplined, with a fixed daily routine of prayer, study, and simple living.

Step 3: Curriculum.

Study centred on Buddhist scriptures, ethics, and philosophy, but also covered subjects like logic, medicine, grammar, and, at large centres like Nalanda, mathematics and astronomy.

Step 4: Method of teaching.

Learning happened through the guru-shishya (teacher-student) method, with oral teaching, discussion, and debate central to how ideas were tested and understood.

Step 5: Notable features.

Education was largely free, supported by donations to the monastery. Large centres like Nalanda attracted students from across Asia, making them early international universities. Discipline and moral training were treated as equally important as academic learning.

The Buddhist education system was monastery-based, entered through ordination, taught through the guru-shishya method, combined religious and secular subjects, and produced renowned centres of learning like Nalanda and Taxila that drew students internationally.

Rabindranath Tagore built his educational ideas around the belief that a child's natural curiosity and creativity should guide learning, not fear or rigid rules. He put this into practice by founding

Shantiniketan in 1901.

Step 2: Education in a natural setting.

Tagore held classes in the open air, under trees, so students stayed in constant contact with nature, seasons, and living things, which he believed sharpened both the mind and the senses.

Step 3: Freedom and self-expression.

He opposed strict discipline and rote memorisation, and instead encouraged students to explore, question, and express themselves freely through art, music, dance, and drama.

Step 4: Mother tongue and Indian culture.

He supported teaching in the child's own language, and wanted education to keep students connected to Indian traditions and values, while still remaining open to world cultures.

Step 5: International outlook.

Tagore later founded Visva-Bharati University, meant to bring together the best of Indian and world thought, reflecting his belief that true education should build both national roots and universal understanding.

Step 1: Meaning of Motivation.

Motivation is the inner drive or external push that starts, directs, and keeps up a person's effort toward a goal. In learning, it is what makes a student want to study, pay attention, and keep trying.

Step 2: Types of motivation.

Intrinsic motivation comes from within, such as genuine interest or the joy of learning itself. Extrinsic motivation comes from outside rewards, such as marks, praise, or prizes.

Step 3: Usefulness in learning - attention and focus.

A motivated student pays closer attention in class and to study material, since their mind is actively engaged rather than distracted.

Step 4: Usefulness in learning - effort and persistence.

Motivation keeps a student trying even when a topic is hard, instead of giving up at the first difficulty, which builds deeper understanding over time.

Step 5: Usefulness in learning - better retention and performance.

Because a motivated learner engages more actively (asking questions, practising, revising), the material is understood more deeply and remembered longer, which shows up as better performance in tests.

28. (OR) What is meant by learning? Explain any one theory of learning with an example.

Solution:

Step 1: Meaning of Learning.

Learning is a relatively lasting change in a person's behaviour or knowledge that happens as a result of experience or practice, rather than from natural growth alone.

Step 2: A theory of learning: Classical Conditioning (Pavlov).

Ivan Pavlov's theory of Classical Conditioning explains learning as forming a new link between a neutral stimulus and an automatic response, through repeated pairing.

Step 3: Pavlov's experiment.

Pavlov noticed that dogs naturally salivate (an unconditioned response) when given food (an unconditioned stimulus). He then rang a bell (a neutral stimulus) just before giving food, and repeated this pairing many times.

Step 4: The result.

After enough repetitions, the dogs began salivating at the sound of the bell alone, even with no food present. The bell had become a conditioned stimulus, and the salivation to it a conditioned response.

Step 5: Classroom example.

A teacher who always praises students right after they answer well (pairing a positive stimulus with the action) can eventually see students feel confident and eager just from being asked a question,

since the question itself becomes linked with a positive expectation.

Final Answer:

Learning is a lasting change in behaviour from experience, and Pavlov's Classical Conditioning theory explains one way this happens: a neutral stimulus, repeatedly paired with a natural response-triggering stimulus, comes to trigger that response on its own.
