evidence to support H.

Step 5: Given condition

It is given that the null hypothesis (H) is rejected at the 0.01 level of significance. This means there is a strong relationship between child-rearing practices and stress proneness.

Step 6: Conclusion

When the null hypothesis is rejected, the alternative (research) hypothesis is accepted. Hence, the research hypothesis that "child-rearing practices do influence stress proneness" stands accepted.

Final Answer: The research hypothesis will be accepted.
