The first thing that a scholar should bear in mind is that a book ought not to be read for mere amusement. Half-educated persons read for amusement, and are not to be blamed for it; they are incapable of appreciating the deeper qualities that belong to a really great literature. But a young man who has passed through a course of university training should discipline himself at an early day never to read for mere amusement. And once the habit of this discipline has been formed, he will find it impossible to read for mere amusement. He will then impatiently throw down any book from which he cannot obtain intellectual food, any book that does not make an appeal to the higher emotions and to his intellect. But on the other hand, the habit of reading for amusement becomes with thousands of people exactly the same kind of habit as wine-drinking or opium-smoking; it is like a narcotic; something that helps to pass the time, something that keeps up a perpetual condition of dreaming, something that eventually results in destroying all capacity for thought, giving exercise only to the surface parts of the mind, and leaving the deeper springs of feeling and the higher faculties of perception unemployed.

a. What sort of people read for amusement?

b. What does the truly educated person read?

Step 4: Final Answer:

The ill effects mentioned are the destruction of the capacity for thought, exercising only the superficial mind, and neglecting the deeper feelings and perceptive faculties.

d. When should one train oneself for reading the right kind of books?

Correct Answer: One should train oneself at an early day.

The question asks for the specific time or stage in life when a person should begin the training for disciplined reading, according to the author.

Step 2: Locating the Information in the Passage:

The passage gives advice specifically to a young person undergoing university training.

Step 3: Detailed Explanation:

The text states: "But a young man who has passed through a course of university training should discipline himself **at an early day** never to read for mere amusement." The phrase "at an early day" clearly indicates the recommended time to start this discipline.

Step 4: Final Answer:

According to the passage, one should train oneself for reading the right kind of books at an early day.

e(i). Explain the phrase 'intellectual food'.

e(ii). Write the opposite word of 'discipline'.

Correct Answer: Indiscipline.

Solution:

The word in the passage nearest in meaning to 'entertainment' is **amusement**.

Solution:

The question tests the knowledge of uncountable nouns. The word 'advice' is an uncountable noun, which means it does not have a plural form (advices) and cannot be used with the indefinite articles 'a' or 'an'.

Step 2: Detailed Explanation:

The original sentence is "He always gave me a valuable advice."

The error here is the use of the article 'a' before the uncountable noun 'advice'. To correct this, the article 'a' must be removed.

Let's analyze the options:

- (i) "He always give me a valuable advice." Incorrect. The tense is changed to present ('give') which doesn't fit with "always gave", and the incorrect article 'a' is still present.
- (ii) "He always gives me a valuable advice." Incorrect. The incorrect article 'a' is still present.
- (iii) "He always gave me valuable advice." Correct. The original past tense 'gave' is maintained, and the incorrect article 'a' has been removed.
- (iv) "He always gives me valuable advice." This sentence is grammatically correct in the simple present tense, but it changes the tense of the original sentence. Option (iii) is a more direct correction of the given sentence.

Step 3: Final Answer:

The correct sentence is **He always** gave me valuable advice.

Quick Tip

Remember that common uncountable nouns like 'advice', 'information', 'furniture', 'luggage', and 'news' cannot be preceded by 'a'/'an' and do not have plural forms. To count them, you can use phrases like "a piece of advice" or "an item of furniture".

Solution:

This question tests two concepts: subject-verb agreement with indefinite pronouns and the correct use of possessive adjectives. Indefinite pronouns like 'no one', 'everyone', and 'someone' are singular and require a singular verb. A noun (brother) being possessed requires a possessive adjective (your).

Step 2: Detailed Explanation:

The original sentence is "No one besides you brother know the fact."

There are two errors:

- 1. Possessive Adjective: "you brother" is incorrect. It should be "your brother".
- 2. **Subject-Verb Agreement:** The subject is "No one", which is singular. Therefore, the verb must also be singular. The singular form of 'know' in the simple present tense is 'knows'.

Let's analyze the options:

- (i) Incorrect. 'have known' is a plural verb form.
- (ii) Incorrect. 'have knowing' is grammatically incorrect.
- (iii) Incorrect. 'known' is a past participle and cannot be used as the main verb here without an auxiliary.
- (iv) Correct. It correctly uses the possessive adjective 'your' and the singular verb 'knows' to agree with the subject 'No one'.

Step 3: Final Answer:

The correct sentence is No one besides your brother knows the fact.

Quick Tip

When you see an indefinite pronoun (like anyone, nobody, each, either), treat it as a singular subject. The verb that follows must be singular (e.g., knows, is, has). Ignore any prepositional phrases (like 'besides your brother') that come between the subject and the verb when determining agreement.

4(c). 'I prefer a pen than a pencil.' Which word in this sentence is an error?

Correct Answer: (iii) than

Solution:

Step 1: Understanding the Concept:

The question tests the correct use of prepositions with specific verbs. The verb 'prefer' is used to express a choice between two or more options. It follows a specific prepositional structure.

Step 2: Detailed Explanation:

The standard structure for the verb 'prefer' when comparing two nouns is prefer + [noun] + to + [noun].

The given sentence is "I prefer a pen than a pencil."

It incorrectly uses the word 'than' for comparison. While 'than' is used with comparative adjectives (e.g., better than, taller than), 'prefer' always takes the preposition 'to'. The correct sentence should be: "I prefer a pen **to** a pencil."

Therefore, the word 'than' is the error in the sentence.

Step 3: Final Answer:

The word that is an error in the sentence is **than**.

Quick Tip

Memorize verbs that are followed by specific prepositions. For example: 'prefer to', 'listen to', 'fond of', 'confident of', 'senior to', 'junior to'. The word 'than' is used for comparison with adjectives in the comparative degree, not with the verb 'prefer'.

Correct Answer: (iv) illusions

Solution:

Step 1: Understanding the Concept:

This question tests the knowledge of commonly confused words, specifically homophones

or near-homophones. The choice between 'illusion' and 'allusion' depends on the intended meaning in the context of a poem.

Step 2: Detailed Explanation:

Let's define the two words:

Illusion: A false idea or belief; a deceptive appearance or impression. (e.g., an optical illusion).

Allusion: An indirect or passing reference to a person, place, event, or another literary work. (e.g., a biblical allusion).

In the context of a poem, which is a literary work, it is highly likely that the author is referring to indirect references ('allusions') rather than false perceptions ('illusions'). An 'obscure allusion' would be a reference that is difficult to understand.

Therefore, the word 'illusions' is used incorrectly. The correct word should be 'allusions'. The corrected sentence would be: "The poem has many obscure allusions".

Step 3: Final Answer:

The word that is an error in the sentence is **illusions**.

Quick Tip

Pay close attention to words that sound similar but have different meanings (homophones). When you encounter such a word, check the context of the sentence to see if its meaning fits. Common examples include affect/effect, principle/principal, and their/there/they're.

Solution:

This question tests the correct idiomatic use of prepositions. Certain phrases and expressions in English require specific prepositions, which do not always follow a logical rule but are established by convention.

When asking for the time as shown by a timepiece like a watch or a clock, the correct preposition to use is 'by'. The standard, idiomatic phrase is "by your watch".

The use of 'in' is incorrect in this context. You might say "The battery is in my watch," but to ask for the time it shows, you must use 'by'.

The correct sentence is: "What is the time by your watch?".

Therefore, the word 'in' is the error.

Step 3: Final Answer:

The word that is an error in the sentence is **in**.
