

Some people believe that museums should be free for everyone, while others argue that visitors should pay an entrance fee. Although charging visitors can help museums cover their expenses, I believe that museums should generally provide free or low-cost access.

The main advantage of free admission is that it makes cultural and educational resources accessible to a wider section of society. Families with limited incomes may avoid museums if entrance fees are expensive.
